Sunrise at the top of Traprain Law on Easter Sunday morning is a special place to be. For years, many people have chosen to get up early, walk to the top of the Law and gather around a wooden cross to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The cross isn't there all the time



but is taken up especially for this event, and is a reminder that the joy and hope of Easter Sunday was preceded by the pain and despair of Good Friday.

We are so familiar with the symbol of the cross that we sometimes forget that it was a tool of torture and capital punishment. The build up to Easter Sunday is not a happy story. It starts with religious and political leaders who feel their power and influence is being threatened by Jesus, and they plot for ways to have him killed. Jesus is betrayed by one of his closest friends, arrested and sentenced to death on spurious charges. He is beaten and humiliated. His followers desert him, and the crowds turn on him. At that stage, the cross is a symbol of defeat and loss. Jesus cried out, 'It is finished'.

The story of Easter is framed by extremes of sadness, violence and death. The bible doesn't ignore or minimise the pain and suffering that was faced by Jesus, but the story doesn't end there. If the story had ended there, I doubt very much that we would even be marking this event at all. The reason that we have the symbol of the cross is not to commemorate his death but to celebrate his life.

The cross has become such a powerful and positive symbol because it now speaks to us of resurrection and new life. Jesus rose from the dead, so we look at a cross and see it as a symbol of victory over death, a triumph of hope over fear.

Easter is not a time to pretend that everything is OK or to ignore our pain. We go into the Easter season fully aware of the hurt and suffering that is going on in our lives and in the wider world. However, this is not the end of the story. The story continues with a sunrise, a new dawn, a different perspective and the assurance that Jesus is alive and with us for ever more. There is a light shining in the darkness, and the darkness can never extinguish it (John 1:5).

Over the coming weeks I pray that you will experience the joy and hope of the Easter message and discover something of the new life that Jesus' resurrection has opened up to us all.
